Sirs:

I am asking for hardship assistance. I have been experiencing technical limitations here at my residence in Eastern Washington, and am asking your forebearance with me to please receive these documents via FAX. I can also furnish complete hard copies to Randy Flykt at the Adams County Prosecuting Attorneys office, which includes 2 more pages of the instant screen text (which do not cut to the heart of the matter). I tried to attach all these PDF files to your electronic submission form, but it said I was feeding it too much information. This may be old school, but I know it WILL GET THROUGH. Thanks for your understanding.

STATEMENTS OF IMPACT TO THE PUBLIC: The distribution of political signs at school during business hours, and the posting of said signs in some classrooms at Scootney Springs Elementary did occur during the time of the Othello Fair, which was held September 11-14 of 2019. Distribution of these signs, and posting of the signs in classrooms exposed students to political advertising which parents may or may not wish their children to be exposed to. These potential liabilities were spelled out to Staff in 2 letters by the Superintendent at the time alleged violations occurred. A candidate who posts their advertising in a place forbidden by law exercises and unfair advantage over other candidates who not enjoy similar access to certain facilities. In a word, its cheating.

EVIDENCE of said violations of RCW 42.17A.555 includes the following documents:

- 1) 2 letters to OSD staff dates 12 and 13 September 2019
- 2) Screen shot of conversation with candidate Lindsy Prows to Sean Bates. 3 of 5 pages

WA State Law - Political Candidates or Ballot Proposition Campaigns 1 message

Good Afternoon OSD Staff,

With the general election upcoming in November, it is important for staff to remember that Washington State Law prohibits the use of school facilities to support or oppose political candidates or ballot proposition campaigns. School facilities includes school district equipment, computers, printers, telephones, buildings, supplies and "email". District email may not be used to assist in campaign activities, not even if you are "on a break."

Employees do not forfeit their rights to engage in political activity because of employment. You may have campaign signs in your cars — you just cannot put up signs in the school or school grounds.

If employees have questions about campaign election guidelines for schools, contact my Executive Assistant, Thalia Lemus.

Common Scenarios

Here are a few common scenarios that have been identified by the State's regulatory and enforcement agency, the Washington Public Disclosure Commission (PDC):

- <u>Use of Email.</u> District email may not be used to assist in campaign activities, not even if you are "on a break."
 You can't even use email for something simple such as telling a campaign committee member that you'll be at a campaign meeting or that you'll wave signs on a certain date.
- Receipt of Email from Others, If you receive a campaign solicitation on your District email, please either ignore
 the email or respond by stating that District email may not be used for election advocacy. You may, however,
 engage in campaign activities on your own time, during non-work hours, and without using District resources.
- <u>Use of School Computer</u>, You may not use your school district computer to compose correspondence, develop presentations, or draft/edit any other campaign documents.
- School Building Publications, Building level publications must not be used for campaign messages or activities.
- <u>Communication with Coworkers</u>. You may inform coworkers during non-work hours about campaign activities, but you may never pressure or coerce participation.
- Student Projects. Students may originate school projects for credit that promote or oppose candidates or ballot
 measures. But those projects may not use District resources that are not regularly and routinely made available
 for other student projects. And you may not use those or any other student projects to influence an election's
 outcome.
- Work Hours. You may not engage in campaigning during work hours or with public resources, including gathering signatures, distributing campaign materials, arranging speaking engagements, coordinating phone banks and fundraising.

Good Afternoon OSD.

I have been asked a couple of questions regarding our Board member candidates (or any candidate) as it relates to sharing our views with our students. I wanted to share my response with everyone, to clarify.

Questions

Are there any rules/laws about teachers spreading their views on candidates during class? Social media?

Response

Per our District Operating Policy (DOP) 5252P, an employee who intends to campaign for an elective office should be advised that the use of students for writing or addressing political materials, or the distribution of such materials to or by students is prohibited and an employee may not campaign for a political candidate or for a political issue during achool hours on school property. This includes sharing your perspective about whether a candidate is good or bad.

Additionally, in regards to social media, the OSD also has DOP 5253P that states that soliciting phone, email, text messages or other forms of written or electronic communication to students without building administrator/supervisor and parent permission when the communication is unrelated to school work or other legitimate school business is an inappropriate boundary invasion by staff members. Furthermore, sending or soliciting email, text messages or other electronic communications to a student also represents an inappropriate boundary invasion, even when the communication relates to school business, except where the parent or guardian and building administrator/supervisor has consented to such communications and receives a copy of the communication.

In a nutshelf, OSD employees should not be spreading their views on candidates during class or through the use of social media to students. Please let me know if you have questions on this matter.
